Materials

You need to bring a binder with paper or a notebook, a pencil, a calculator and your book to class <u>EVERYDAY</u>. You <u>must</u> have a TI-84 graphing calculator for this course. There will be multiple activities throughout the year that require the use of the TI-84. Calculators are available for rent for the school year. See Mrs. Karnatz in the book room for details.

Homework Assignments

Homework is due the day after it is assigned. 5% of your grade will be **Homework Completion**. Completion credit is earned for attempting all problems. There will be no penalties for wrong answers. Late homework from a given target will be accepted up until the quiz for that target for full credit. Any homework turned in after the quiz but before the unit test will be given half credit.

Tardies

The district tardy policy states the following consequences for being late to class:

1st = Teacher Warning

4th = Counselor Referral $2^{\text{nd}} = 10$ minute detention $2^{nd} = 10$ minute detention $3^{rd} = 15$ minute $5^{th} = AP$ Referral (Thurs or Sat) $6^{th} = One day$ ISS $3^{rd} = 15$ minute detention

4th = Counselor Referral

 7^{th} or more = Two days ISS

NO PASS List Policy: Students accumulating 10 or more TOTAL tardies during a semester will be placed on a building-wide NO PASS list.

Phones

Your phone should not be out during class unless directed to do so by me. Once we are finished with a lesson, you may use your phone appropriately for the remainder of the class period. For your first offense, I will confiscate the phone for the remainder of the class period and you will receive a warning. All subsequent violations will be referred to your dean or assistant principal for administrative consequences.

Attendance

Daily attendance is very important in math! Missing a day will not directly affect your grade, but since everything we do builds on what we did before, frequent absences will be very detrimental to your understanding. Make every effort to be in class everyday and to make up all make up work in a timely manner. In cases of an extended absence lasting more than one day, be sure to see me so we can work out a timeline to get you caught up on material missed. YOU are responsible for completing make-up work in a timely fashion.

Grades

Grades are available online through the Infinite Campus Parent Portal. This is updated at least weekly. **Parents** and students should each have login info so everyone can keep up with current progress in class.
